### INTRODUCTION

Welcome to this brief potted history of five decades of Lea Sports.

The Club is unrecognisable now from the single team that a group of teachers put together in Luton in 1973 – we now have 15 teams from Under 7 to Veterans and there is every prospect that the Club will continue to grow, providing we can find more pitches to play on!

From its original base in Leagrave Park in Luton, the Club has moved home over the years to Barnfield College and Stopsley Recreation Centre in Luton, before moving lock, stock and barrel to Pirton in 1995. The Club has now been based at the Rec for more than a quarter of a century and it is now very much home.

The name too has changed over the years.

The original title was **L.E.A. Sports**, to show that it represented the Local Education Authority – nothing to do with the river! After a merger with Stopsley Boys' Club in 1992, which saw the first Lea Sports youth teams, the name became **Lea Sports Stopsley**. The 'L.E.A.' became just 'Lea' as the connections with the teaching profession slowly waned. The move to Pirton in 1995 saw the name change again, to **Lea Sports Pirton**, until, finally, after the merger with mini-soccer club S & G United (Shillington & Gravenhurst United) in 2008 the name became '**Lea Sports PSG'** (nothing to do with a similar club in the French capital!).



The owl first appeared on the club badge sometime in the late 1980s, based on a design created by former player Mick Marsh. The idea was that the owl's wisdom was a nod to the teaching profession – most of us think that the real reason was that Mick was a Sheffield Wednesday fan...

Almost 2,300 players have now appeared in Lea Sports shirts of various colours and hues over the years. It has of course not been possible to mention them all, so I have had to be selective and there are bound to be people who are well-worthy of a mention, but whose names do not appear in this brief reflection of around 8,000 matches. My apologies to them.

There have been many sponsors as well – again, too many to mention – but a special word must go to Hugh Byrne, whose company Form I.T. Solutions (formerly Premier Computer Supplies) has been with us since the 1980s. Hugh will get his own mention later, but massive thanks to him for his support for the club for more than 40 years.

I wish the Club the very best of luck for the future. I certainly won't be around for the eightieth anniversary, but with a bit of luck and a following wind I might be around for the sixtieth. Who knows? I wouldn't have missed it for the world.

# LEA SPORTS PSG FC - THE FIRST FIFTY YEARS

### The Seventies and Eighties

The football world in 1973 was not such a different place: Liverpool won the league, with Arsenal as runners-up. In the FA Cup, Luton Town reached the sixth round before losing to eventual winners Sunderland (despite doing the double over them in the league).



Off the field, life was quite different however: mobile phones were just beginning to appear (although still the size of bricks); computers had been

invented, but were enormous and clunky and usually only owned by companies for their accounts; standard ways of networking computers were only just starting to be invented and the World Wide Web was at least 15 years away. The music scene was vibrant: Dark Side of the Moon and Tubular Bells were released.

It was over a few pints in this primitive age that a group of junior school teachers in Luton got together and decided to form a football team, probably in response to the League Secretary Alan Hardacre's plea for football to 'entertain and excite' to counter falling attendances. They came up with the snappy name of L.E.A. Sports (the L.E.A. stood for Local Education Authority) and in a short time the yellow and black stripes of the new team were buzzing around the pitches of Luton. From their home base at Luton Regional Sports Centre, it is debatable whether they 'entertained and excited' and indeed little is known of that first season. We do know that the first County Cup campaign ended in September, with a 2-1 defeat to Brookhurst (Kelvin Callow with the goal), but few other detailed records from 1973-74 survive.

The standard gradually improved and 1975 saw an appearance in the Bedfordshire Lower Junior Cup semi-final (which we lost 5-0 to Greyhound). Indeed, the following year we went one better and reached the final, only for a missed penalty by Micky Briggs to prove costly as we lost 2-1 to United Counties (http://www.leasports.com/Cup\_Finals.htm#4th\_April\_1976).

By the 1977-78 season, not only was a Reserve team formed, but yours truly made his début (for the Reserves vs. Globe Sports on 4<sup>th</sup> December 1977 – a stunning 0-0 draw). The club had moved to a new home, Leagrave Park, near the source of the River Lea, and were playing in all red, hoping that some of the Shankly magic would wear off on them, although there was still no sign that anything other than Division 4 of the North Home Counties would be achieved.

### A Turnaround in Fortunes in the Eighties

Everyone hoped that the new decade of the Eighties would bring success, but in truth things got worse: the First Team were relegated in 1981 to Division 5, finishing 12<sup>th</sup> of 13 teams, while the Reserves finished 12<sup>th</sup> in Division 7 with just 2 teams below them. In 1983, for the 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary, I put together a magazine for the end-of-season celebration, which saw ex-Wales International Paul Price present the awards at the Moat House in Luton. The idea caught on and I have produced a magazine every year since.

In 1984-85, with the team struggling in Division 5, two things happened: my constant knee problems made me give up playing and take on the position of First Team Manager, and striker Mark Doyle

joined the Club. Doyle was an instant success and brought the touch of class to the team that was needed to turn around its fortunes. In 1985-6 he scored 33 goals and took the team to third place and promotion back to Division 4; the following year saw another third place and promotion to the dizzy heights of Division 3. By this time Rick Vipers had taken the Reserves up to Division 6 and in 1987 they won their first ever cup match, after six seasons of trying!

The final years of the eighties saw some great football from the Firsts: a Whitbread Cup win over Division One rivals Hexton and Phil Thompson and Alan Dawson scoring for fun. In the 1988-89 season Phil scored 7 in a 17-0 win over Holy Ghost, but was still pipped for top scorer by Alan Dawson with 29. The final season of the eighties, 1989-90, was my last as Manager, with the Firsts playing in Division 2, but the team struggled and needed a draw from their final fixture to avoid relegation. Unfortunately, they were playing Harvest Home who needed a win to be Champions. A tight game was all-square until the last 2 minutes, when tired legs allowed a ball to be scrambled home from short range for Harvest Home to win 2-1. The decade had ended as it had started, with relegation. The season also was the first league campaign for the Third Team, playing in the South Beds Division 3, but this too went badly and the team finished second-to-bottom conceding 109 league goals.

### **The Nineties and Noughties**

### Expansion and Success in the Nineties – Before the Crash

The First Team had been too good to go down and proved the fact in 1990-91 when it won the Division 3 Championship, although the points total of 28 from 20 games was the lowest for many years – they were just 7 points ahead of the 8<sup>th</sup> placed team. The Reserves were by now in Division 5, where they established themselves as a steady mid-table team, and John Pawley's Third Team tried their hand at the Luton Sunday League, but with much the same result, finishing second-to-bottom again.

By 1993-94, however, fortunes had changed: the First Team finished 4<sup>th</sup> in Division 2 for the second season running, with Phil Thompson scoring 37 goals; the Reserves finished in their best-ever position, 4<sup>th</sup> in Division 5, becoming the first-ever Lea Sports team to win over 20 games in one season; I took over as Third Team Manager and we were pipped for the Championship of the Luton Sunday League by one point (thanks to a late penalty for Purley Tavern given by Bernie Thompson. Am I still bitter? You bet!). Even the Fourth Team were playing league football and many former players will remember the trip to St. Albans City's ground to see them play in the Invitation Cup Final: a great night out, despite a 1-0 defeat. The first Saturday team also put in an appearance, finishing a creditable 4<sup>th</sup> in the Luton & District Division 1 and the season also marked the second campaign of youth football for the Club, following a merger with Stopsley Boys' Club in 1992.

The 1994-95 season was the Club's last in Luton, following the decision to move lock, stock and barrel to Pirton. The final game – a midweek encounter with the notorious Strawplaiters – was a violent affair which nearly ended in a riot. Strawplaiters needed to win to stand any chance of being Champions and when Phil Thompson equalised in a 4-4 draw they wanted to fight everyone, including the referee and me as linesman.

The 1995-96 season was Laurence Freed's first as First XI Manager and the Club's first in Pirton, although Bedfordshire County Cup matches still had to be played within the county boundary because of the Association's archaic rules. Despite having to settle in to our new home, the season brought three cup finals: the Fourth Team brought the first cup silverware, winning against

Woodlands Social in the Invitation cup, and whereas the Thirds lost their final against Chalton Strollers in Pirton, the organisation on the day showed what could be achieved with the facilities available to us. Our third final was for our netballers, who lost to the renowned Vauxhall Golds, but brought great credit to the club in the process.

By 1998-99 the First Team had achieved its goal of a place in the Premier Division, but it was not to be a happy experience. The team won just 3 of its 20 matches and although it retained its place in the top flight by the skin of its teeth, the playing squad was not a happy one. By October of the 1999-2000 season the team had collapsed and the Club was left with no alternative but to withdraw the team from the league.

The seventies and eighties had both finished with relegation and now the nineties had finished in disaster. The Reserves, now in Division 3, took over as the First Team and we prepared to start again. The Thirds and Fourths both played in the South Beds League and both finished in third place in Division 1 and 2 respectively, but the relationship with the league administration was not a happy one and the following year saw us back in the Luton Sunday League again. Meanwhile, Hitchin Reds had joined the Club as its Saturday side, but a poor disciplinary record saw them expelled from the Club after disgraceful scenes at the Club's own 4-a-side tournament. With the Under 13 Reds finishing halfway down Division 2 and the Blues finishing joint bottom of Division 3, it was left to the Under 10s to restore some pride to the Club as they finished runners-up in the Chiltern Youth league Division 2.


### **Steady Improvement Through the Noughties**

With the First Team back in Division 3 and Steve Baggett taking charge, hopes were high of success in the 2000-01 season, but Mother Nature took over and in the wettest winter on record the

league was abandoned after 14 league matches. The Reserves too, back in Division 5, played just 14 games. The Thirds also were washed out, while the Fourths, after 8 great seasons which saw them achieve a record of over 60%, folded after just 2 games.

Baggy was not to be deterred, however, and despite taking just one point from the first 4 matches of 2001-02, a run of ten games unbeaten in January and February brought the Division 3 title. The Reserves relied on experience, with Rick Vipers and Archie Conway having over 1,000 games under their belts as they marshalled the defence in Division 5.

A new third team was created, playing in the Hitchin Sunday League, but most players were strangers to the Club and the experiment failed, with the team finishing second-to-bottom.



Apart from the Division 3 title, the other highpoint of the season was the Under Sixteens' appearance in the Royston Crow League Cup Final vs. county cup winners Stevenage Borough. Despite taking the lead in extra time, the lads were pegged back by a very late equaliser, before an agonising 2-3 defeat on penalties, with top scorer Ben L'Honoré missing his crucial kick.

By the middle of the decade, the youth teams were well-established: in 2003-04 the Under 12s scored 141 goals, 122 in the league, while the Under 13s banged in 89 and only lost the championship because of an administrative mix-up in the first match, which saw them docked 3 points. Bob Smith's

Under 15s reached a low point, however: having lost prolific scorer Matt Kenneford to Luton Town, the team had some discipline problems and Bob pulled them out of the league after Christmas. The following season saw the Under 11s sweep all before them in the Chiltern Youth Division 3 and reach the semi-finals of the County Cup, before being pipped in extra time by eventual winners Letchworth Garden City Eagles.

The following year a new Under 11 side, under Greg Nunn, finished as runners-up in Division 1 and won the Chiltern Youth league cup, conceding just one goal in the process as they crushed St. Josephs 6-1 in the final. Meanwhile, the Under 14s took the Chiltern Youth Division 3 title, scoring 100 league goals, although they conceded 3 or more goals in no fewer than 13 games. The Club also achieved the F.A.'s Charter Standard status for the first time and after ten years in Pirton were now regarded as a well-run, established Club.

The final part of the jigsaw came in 2008 when Lea Sports Pirton, as the Club was then known, merged with Shillington & Gravenhurst United (S & G), who also, by a happy coincidence, played in red and black stripes. This allowed the Club, now named Lea Sports PSG, to achieve Charter Standard Development status and, with qualified FA coaches, to offer football to players from four years old to Veterans. By the end of their fourth decade, the First Team were back in Division 1, where they beat all of the four sides who finished above them in the table. The Reserves had fought their way back to Division 3, where they finished mid-table, despite an 8-1 thrashing of Champions Markyate. The Third, Fourth and Saturday teams had all gone by the wayside, but the youth section was well represented, with teams at four age groups, and there were mini-soccer teams at Under 8, 9 and 10.

### The Twenty Tens

The early twenty-tens saw the Sunday First eleven reach its best standard since the season in the North Home Counties Premier Division in 1998-99. A solid squad of players progressed to third place in Division One in 2011-12 and reached the semi-finals of the Hertfordshire Sunday Intermediate Cup – this team was probably the best Sunday First team in Lea Sports history. But the following 3 or 4 seasons saw the team become increasingly fragmented, finishing in the bottom half of the table for 3 seasons before collapsing altogether in 2015-16. This meant that the team was relegated and the Reserves took over as the new First team, finishing bottom of Division 2 in 2016-17. By this time, the North Home Counties League – at one time one of the strongest Sunday leagues in the country with 9 divisions at its peak – was also in trouble, with many teams leaving or folding. The First XI finished in second place in two consecutive seasons, but the standard was becoming increasingly poor and in 2019 the decision was taken to move to the Hitchin Sunday League. 2018-19 was our last season in the North Home Counties – a season in which we scored 136 goals, including 50 in the 2 league games vs. Wheelwrights Arms.

Saturday football looked to be flourishing in 2010-11, as Paul 'Cheesy' Collins led the Saturday XI to the Championship of the Beds County Division 2, also winning the Bedfordshire Junior Cup. But, the team only managed 8<sup>th</sup> place in Division 1 in the following season and some players were unhappy with a mid-table position. By 2012-13 the situation had become worse and the team folded during that season.

A new Saturday team arose in 2014-15 and finished runners-up in Division 3 in their first season. Promoted to Division 2, Joe Hennem started to find his shooting boots, and within 2 years the team were 3<sup>rd</sup> in Division 2 and promoted to Division 1. Two solid, but unspectacular, seasons in Division 1 followed, before the pandemic hit.

By 2013-14, our first nine-a-side teams appeared, although it wasn't until the end of the decade that we finally got to grips with the format, with the Lions and Pumas sides all having successful seasons. Although the Lions, now playing at Under 12, dipped below the 50% win rate in 2019-20, the Lynx, in their second season, won more than they lost, while all three Under 11 Pumas teams recorded very strong seasons.

It was at the seven-a-side format that we showed our strength, beginning with 2 Under 10 teams in 2010-11 both recording win rates of over 60% and Louis Lomas banging in 38 goals. The next 3 seasons were very successful, with 4 teams playing at Under 10 in 2013-14 and all having great seasons. There was a dip mid-decade as these teams moved up to the 9v9 format, but by the end of the decade once again we had a plethora of successful Under 9 and Under 10 teams.

The five-a-side format also appeared in 2012-13, with the appearance of the Under 7 Jaguars. It was these teams that were to produce the most prolific scorers, with Samuel Bayley scoring 79 goals in his first 2 seasons with the Jags. Jamie Williams then came along and scored 76 in his first two seasons with the Lions at Under 7 and Under 8. The goals continued to flow and in 2016-17, with 3 teams at Under 7 and 3 at Under 8, we scored a total of 868 goals in 145 games, with Jake Murray scoring 62 for the Under 7 Leopards.

By the end of the decade, there was just one team (the Under 8 Jaguars) still playing 5v5, but a decade of successful teams and scorers had mostly stayed with the Club and were progressing through the age groups.

### **The Twenty Twenties**

The first 2 seasons of the 2020s were, of course, blighted by the global COVID pandemic. The 2020-21 season was particularly badly hit, with most games cancelled, or played with sides hit by illness. Only the Veterans managed to complete a full campaign, finishing runners-up in Division 1 of the Mid-Herts Veterans League.

Things began to recover in 2021-22, with the Saturday Reserves taking the Championship of the Beds County Division 4 and the Saturday First XI reaching the final of the Beds Centenary Cup, losing in the final to Cranfield United Reserves. The numbers of games played across the age ranges slowly increased, although the shadow of COVID still hung over us.

It was not until 2022-23 that things felt 'normal' again and we saw a full set of fixtures. In summary, the adults did well (although the Saturday Reserves performed poorly), whereas the youth teams were not so good (although the Under 15 Lions won Division 2). Teenage teams continue to pose challenges of player retainment, but new teams and new forms of the game are still coming through.

### 1. Paris 1990

In May 1990, Lea Sports embarked on their first foreign tour. A mixture of Sunday First, Second and Third team players set off to play two friendly matches in Paris. At about 2 pm on Sunday 27<sup>th</sup> May 1990 we were driving round some Parisian suburbs in our coach looking for the ground of a club called USM Gagny. After two or three trips round the block, we realised with some trepidation that the 2,000-seater stadium which we had dismissed a couple of times was actually the venue for the game.



As the 1991 Magazine puts it: "There we were with no recognised keeper and a mixture of our three teams against a side who had reached the last 32 of the French FA Cup. I thought we did very well to keep the score down to 10-2 – and we did score 2 very good goals. I remember afterwards talking to the French captain and asking him if they had played any other English teams. He replied 'Yes, last season. What were they called ... Ah, yes! ... Nottingham Forest.'". Apparently, they had beaten the Forest colts side (with 2 first teamers) 2-0. So perhaps we didn't do too badly."



One of the main memories is Hugh Byrne leading the singing at the after-match party – in fact, the celebrations went on so well that our hosts went out and bought another barrel of beer to keep the festivities going until well into the night.

One other strange coincidence from that Tour concerned our tour guide. The main guide was a lady called Rima Nouri, originally from Damascus, for whom I would have happily walked across a football pitch of hot coals – she was lovely!

Anyway, on our second day Rima was unavailable and sent a friend of hers along as a replacement for our trip to the Eiffel Tower. When the replacement turned up, he mentioned something about having played for a schoolteachers' team about a decade earlier. He was totally amazed when we were able to show him his name, Mick Barnfather, in our records, including the match on 22<sup>nd</sup> March 1981 when he appeared in a Third team match vs. Marshalswick School and scored a hat-trick in a 5-2 win with only 8 men!



### 2. Düsseldorf 1991

May 1991 saw our first foray onto German soil – or, more accurately, German gravel as our first friendly was played against SV Hilden-Ost on a gravel pitch. In a friendly match against a great group of lads, Phil Thompson scored his first overseas goal (despite playing the first half in goal) as we won the match 4-3.





After a day out in Cologne, where everyone got to enjoy the impressive cathedral with its fantastic pavement art on the adjoining square, plus quite a few of the local hostelries, the squad was a bit jaded for the second match of the trip, which ended in a pretty uneventful 0-0 draw against Sparta Bilk.

Lea Sports remain to this day undefeated in Germany!

### 3. Paris 1992

It was back to Paris for the 1992 tour. The decision was made to leave immediately after the Awards Evening at Luton Rugby Club, so many players turned up in pyjamas ready for the overnight ferry trip, although at least Steve Close wore a tie...



The games themselves were not particularly memorable - the first game brought a 5-1 defeat with Trev Taylor scoring a consolation header against UJA Alfortville and the second match was a 3-3 draw against Neuillysur-Marne, with Steve Bingham scoring one goal and Russell Sheppard scoring twice. I think it was Steve Bingham who also won the races around the athletics track before the game.

My main memories of the trip were a stunning tour of the Louvre and a visit by the lads to Disneyland – I can still see Andy Shiers walking back from the trip with a balloon in one hand and a pair of deely-boppers on his head! (Andy: if you're reading this is New Zealand, best wishes to you mate!).

My dear cousin Neil Wilkinson and his room-mate 'Strawman' Andy Sheridan decided it was a good idea to trash their hotel room – I had to pretend that I didn't speak French when the hotel manager sought me ought to have a moan.

At least the kit looked smart – take a look at those shorts!





### 4. Cologne 1994

After a year's break, for the continent to recover, the Club decided on a tour to Cologne. It is called the Cologne Tour because that's where we stayed, but the matches themselves were played just over the border in Holland.







The first match was on Sunday 29<sup>th</sup> May 1994 against V.V. Stadbroek and was a great success with a 4-2 victory. Apparently, Stadbroek were not well-liked in the local area, but they did us proud after the game and didn't seem put off at all by the Lea Sports World Tour T-shirts, proclaiming 'Do I Not Like Orange' over a picture of Graham Taylor.

The lads were all set for a mammoth session on the Sunday night, but we told them that the following day's game, against V.V.Achilles, was a major event for the home side and was being treated as a testimonial game for one of their best players. A large crowd was expected and it was even being covered by local TV and radio. The team took it seriously and many of the lads kept to soft drinks on the evening before the big game.

Even the coach driver was in on it and when he asked for directions to the ground, we told him just to follow the crowd wearing blue and white scarves. In the event, of course, just one man and his dog turned up and we didn't play any better for being sober.



Best of all though was the scam after the game. We got the bus driver to announce that the German border guards were likely to check our passports because of recent IRA activity in the area. (We knew that Strawman Andy Sheridan had left his passport back in the hotel). We told Andy to go and hide in the bus's toilet (which was by now not in the best condition after 3 days of touring). Sure enough, the bus driver pulled over at the (deserted) border and Hugh Byrne stepped up with his best German accent and asked to inspect passports. He pretended to consult a list of players and asked "Ver iss ze Andrew Sheridan?".

At this point a very sheepish and grey-faced Strawman emerged from the toilet to howls of laughter from all on board. Priceless!

# FORTY FIVE YEARS AGO - 1977-78 SEASON

### First XI

Ivan Lawrence began his fifth season in charge of Lea Sports First XI. In its four previous seasons the Club had hardly set the footballing world alight, finishing 11<sup>th</sup>, 6<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> in Division 4 of the North Home Counties League. The team was predominantly junior school teachers from Luton and with the new school intake in September came renewed hope. The season started well with a 3-2 win over Stoneygate, who were the senior school teachers' team – so something of a derby win. Phil Clarke, Mick Walter and Mick Morgan were the goalscorers.

The good start continued with a 6-3 Junior Cup win over Wells Star and two draws with Star, who would later go on to be Champions. However, a dip in form before Christmas saw the team take 2 points from 12 and crash out of both cups. New blood was needed and the Club made two major signings from Royal Oak: Charlie McNerney and, yes, Steve Smith! Yours truly made his debut for the First XI on 11<sup>th</sup> December 1977 in a 3-2 home win over Nesco United. I actually made my Club debut the week before for the Reserves – I felt bad about that as it was the only game Bruce Bonfield missed at full-back all season.

I don't remember the game against Nesco, but the records show that the sadly-missed Wojtek Gabrys scored twice and Phil Clarke, making one of his rare appearances as a substitute, got the third. A steady finish saw the team finish 8<sup>th</sup> of 12 teams, with Wojtek finishing as top scorer with 14 goals from 24 games. Ivan Lawrence was ever-present in goal, with Mick Briggs, Chris Castle, Ali Hearn, Don North and Andy Thompson all making over 20 appearances each.



# From the Minutes of the First Lea Sports' Meeting:

"Wednesday, January 17<sup>th</sup> 1973. The inaugural meeting of L.E.A. Sports was made up of 13 persons representing 12 schools, who all took advantage of the well-stocked facilities of the bar at the Teachers' Centre..."

### Second XI

1977 saw the debut of a Lea Sports Reserve side, playing in Division 7 of the North Home Counties League. Glen Pullen took charge as the team prepared for its first campaign. However, Division 7 came as a bit of a shock as the team lost its first seven matches, scoring just four goals and conceding 33.

Their first victory was a home game on October 23<sup>rd</sup> 1977 against Linmeer, who were eventually to finish in bottom place. Barry Ainsworth (the 'offside king') and Andy Walker both scored twice in a 4-0 win.

This was not the start of a winning streak, however, with the team only managing a further four points before Christmas.

Things did improve slightly in the New Year and at least we scored a few goals, even if we didn't win that many games. In the end the team finished 10<sup>th</sup> of 14 teams. By the end of the season, despite an 8-1 win in the return vs. Linmeer, no-one had managed to score a hat-trick – indeed we had to wait until March 1980 for that when Wojtek Gabrys scored three against Electricity AFC.

Nevertheless, the team was up and running and only seven years later Rick Vipers took them to the dizzy heights of Division 6... Barry Ainsworth ran out as top scorer with 9 goals in 25 games, closely followed by Andy Walker with 7 in 17. No-one played in all 26 games, although Barry Ainsworth, Bruce Bonfield and Tony Riley all managed 25, with Phil Hudspeth playing 24 times in goal.

# FORTY YEARS AGO - 1982-83 SEASON

### First XI

First team Captain Keith Lee felt that Lady Luck deserted the team in the 1982-83 season. The team, now in its second season in Division 5, had battled through to the quarter finals of the Luton News Cup, with 2-1 wins over FC Coral (now CSFC) and Hydrosteer and now faced Division 6 side Housing Social for a semi-final place. However, at this point the elements decided to play a part and the game took place in a howling gale at Barnfield College. The gale-force wind and torrential rain made the game a lottery and we ended up losing 2-0. One shot from Phil Clarke flew over the bar and fence and the ball disappeared down Old Bedford Road never to be seen again. Most games in the area were cancelled that day, but in one or two of those that did go ahead players were collapsing from what the Luton News described as 'hypothermia and exposure'!

As with the current season, that bad and unexpected cup defeat saw a change in the team's fortunes and all chances of promotion disappeared with an indifferent run after Christmas.

Phil Clarke topped the goalscoring charts with 28 in 25 games, ably assisted by Mick Meehan who scored a further 14.

### Second XI

In 1982-83 Wojtek Gabrys took on the role of Reserve Team Manager for the first and only time. The report for the magazine was written by his Captain Rick Vipers and began thus:

"It has been said that you can prove anything with statistics. If that is so, can you please tell me how to arrange the following to show that the Reserves have had a successful season...

P.26 W.9 D.4 L.13 F49 A.60 Pts.22"

Mind you, the team did use 41 players that season, including seven different goalkeepers. Before Christmas they took 16 points from a possible 22 (2 points for a win), while after Christmas they took just 6 from a possible 30.

Whatever the post-match reasons (excuses) the fact remains that the team just got very good at losing and once they started they forgot to stop.


Dave Pymont came up with a helpful suggestion to cope with the situation: "If we're going to lose, let's lose gracefully. Put Chris Castle at centre-forward!"

#### Third XI

The Third Team were playing friendly matches against local Round Tables and colleges, etc. John Williams operated as 'Third Team Controller' (they didn't like the word 'Manager' for some reason!). His comments speak volumes: "the success of the Third Team has once again been measured not by the results on the field, but by the excellent team spirit throughout the side and the sheer enjoyment of playing football." Well said, John!

(By the way, they won one and drew two of their eighteen games that season.)

At the end of the season a dinner was held at the Moat House in Luton to celebrate ten years of Lea Sports. With Welsh International Paul Price turning up to present the awards a good time was had by all and the future looked rosy for the Club.

### 35 YEARS AGO - 1987-88 SEASON

### First XI

Season 1987-88 saw Steve Smith start his fourth year as First Team Manager. The team had risen to the dizzy heights of Division Three for the first time and we couldn't wait to see what the Whitbread Cup would bring (no more Luton News Cup, that was now for the minnows!).

As it was, the First Round saw us drawn at home to First Division high-fliers Hexton. The master-stroke of playing Barry Pearce as a sweeper worked beautifully. Not only did he thwart the Hexton forwards time and again, but popped up to score the winner in a famous 2-1 victory.

We couldn't wait for Round Two – another home draw, this time against Premier Division runners-up Luton Way. Half-time came and we were trailing by a single goal and Will O'Leary had hit a post. Then the bubble burst and the final result of 1-10 was a bit of a reality check!

Never mind, we held our own in the division with 22 points from 22 games and did achieve a great 4-1 win away to runners-up SKF Social Reserves. Top scorer for the season was Will O'Leary with 23 goals, while striker Alan Dawson played in 28 of our 30 games.

### Second XI

The Reserves under Manager Bill Hind just managed to stave off relegation back to Division 7. Phil Thompson lent the team a hand at the end of the season, weighing in with 6 goals in 5 games, including a hat-trick in the final match — a 10-2 victory over Unit One, when even 'keeper Bryn Holmes got his name on the scoresheet.

The team's debut in the Luton News Cup ended in a win over Barbarians (3-2) with goals from Kev Boxall, Pete Conquest and Geoff Richardson, followed by a second-round defeat to Magnum Reserves (0-2).

Two or three first-teamers (including your editor!) played in a 2-2 draw against champions Old Moat House (who went unbeaten in 22 matches). Ali Hearn popped up with both goals in that game.

Kevin Boxall was the team's top scorer, managing 10 goals, whereas many team changes meant that in 28 matches only Kev Boxall made over 20 appearances, with Rick Vipers making 19 starts.

### Third XI

Maurice Dawson, Jim Gahagan and Geoff Richardson took joint stewardship of the Thirds, who were still playing friendly matches. The team enjoyed a full fixture list and played no fewer than 28 games in the season, using some 47 players.

There were 6 victories, of which the best was probably an 8-3 win over FSL in the final match, although a few first-team 'guests' did feature in the team that night. An attacking line-up featured Phil Clarke (who scored a hat-trick), Phil Thompson (1), Alan Dawson (1), Dave Pymont (1), Geoff Richardson (2) and Will O'Leary, who must have been sick as a parrot after not scoring!

The season was remarkable for a run of five games from December 1987 to February 1988 which all ended up as 5-2 defeats. The run was ended on 21<sup>st</sup> February with a 3-4 defeat to a team called 'Finishing Services'.

But one thing has stayed consistent and that has always been the organisation of the club, which has remained strong, with members giving up their time and energies to ensure the smooth running of the various teams and one person has featured more than anyone in my end-of-season reports over the years and that is Steve Smith, who has given and continues to give his time and energy freely to the betterment of the Club.



# THE GOLDEN BOOT



The Golden Boot Shield, for the highest goalscorer in an 11-a-side team, was introduced in the 2001-02 season, following Matt Kenneford's remarkable 74 goals for the Under 13s. That total has only been topped once since – by Matt Morton with 75 goals in 2016-17 when he was playing for both Under 13 teams. Since then, other awards have been introduced for the different formats of the game: the **Mini Golden Boot** was created in 2008-09 for the seven-a-side format, with Samuel Boggon taking the first award with 36 goals for the Under 9s. In 2012-13, the **Steve Smith Shield** was introduced for the top scorer in a five-a-side team —the first winner was Samuel Bayley, with 48 goals for the Under 7s. The following year saw the introduction of the **Nines Shield**, for the top scorer in the 9 vs. 9 format. Noah Nyoni took the first award with 9 goals for the Under 11s.

### 30 YEARS AGO - 1992-93 SEASON

Steve Smith received a 'Long Service Award' from Luton Borough Council for his time with the Club! Kelvin Callow played his 500<sup>th</sup> game. The Netball Team won the League Division 1.

#### First XI

Kev Boxall took over as Manager from Keith Lee for the Club's second campaign in Division 2. A disappointing start saw two 3-3 draws and four defeats in the first 6 games, including exits from both Whitbread and Bedfordshire Junior Cups.

Things improved dramatically, however, and a draw in the final game would have seen us finish third behind Lilley and Luton Way Reserves. Marshalled by Micky Justin, the team had the best of the game against AFC Wigmore, until a speculative shot in the dying minutes gave Wigmore a 1-0 win to leave us in fourth spot.

A 2-2 draw with Champions Lilley and a 3-0 thrashing of Luton Way Reserves were the best performances, while Steve Close was top scorer with 9 goals.

### Second XI

Al Mayman took over from Steve Smith as the Reserves' Manager, hoping to improve on the team's fourth spot in Division 5. However, there were only 2 wins pre-Christmas: 1-0 over Kenilworth Rangers and 4-0 over bottom-placed Luton British Rail.

Things picked up after the break with a 6-match unbeaten run, including a 4-0 win over Crescent Social and a 6-0 thrashing of Casa Bianca, before a dip in form brought just 2 wins from the last eight games and sixth place in the league. Phil Clarke scored 14 of the team's 53 goals, while Clarke, Archie Conway, Neil Hebron, Keith Lee, Al Mayman and Rick Vipers all played over 20 games.

### **Third Team**

John Pawley took charge for the team's third season in the Luton Sunday League Division 1. They managed to use 56 players in 18 games, finishing 8<sup>th</sup> of 10 teams. The best result was a 12-3 win over Meds, with Scott Carnegie-Brown scoring 4. Hugh Byrne, Horace Savage and Will O'Leary also scored that day.

The team did play in their first Cup Final – the Steve Smith Trophy (no relation!), played at Kingsway, where we lost 2-0 to Champions Norman King.

Will O'Leary was top scorer with 21 goals, while Steve Baggett played in 24 of the 26 games (and was second-top scorer with 9).

### **Fourth Team**

The Fourths played league football for the first time, in Division 2 of the Luton Sunday League, under the stewardship of Neil Wilkinson.

Like the Thirds, they won 6 of their 18 games and finished third from bottom, the title going to Purley Tavern. The team scored in every game, except a final friendly against Luton College and their tally of 57 goals was the best of the adult sides. Mind you, they shared the goals around and top scorer was Steve Bingham with 5 goals in just 3 games!

### **Under Eighteens**

1992-93 saw the merger between Lea Sports and Stopsley Boys Club, with the Club playing as 'Lea Sports Stopsley'. Four youth teams were in operation, with Jim Hughes in charge of the Under 18s in a tough Division 1 of the Chiltern Youth League.

The team managed just 2 wins and 2 draws from 12 games, finishing 6<sup>th</sup> of 7 teams. Then, as now!, goalscoring was the problem with only 14 goals scored in the league (Stuart Straker with 5 of those, plus a further 4 in cup games).

Jim Hughes was a well-known and well-respected Manager and the team won the Sportsmanship Award for the Under 18 section of the Chiltern Youth League.

### **Under Seventeens**

The Under 17s had a nightmare! The start wasn't too bad, with a 3-2 defeat vs. Wingrave, but in the next 6 games we scored 5 and conceded 62 goals. Attempts to bolster the team failed and it folded with 13 games of the season to go, having lost every match.

### **Under Fifteens**

The Under 15s under Kieran Dimambro had a good season finishing runners-up and imposing the only 2 defeats on champions Sundon Park Rangers in Chiltern Youth League Division 2. Tom Quick scored 17 goals in 18 games. Gary Morrell and Peter Cox also appeared in every match.

Robert O'Dell scored 22 of the team's 47 goals, but they conceded 104 and finished 11<sup>th</sup> of 14 teams in CY Division 1. Rob would go on to score 160 goals in 136 games for the Club.

Only 20 players were used with O'Dell, Ross Carter and Steven Pugh ever-present.

### 25 YEARS AGO - 1997-98 SEASON

### First XI

1997-98 was one of the best seasons in the First Team's history. Laurence Freed, who had taken the Reserves to the Division 5 title three years earlier, took charge and built a solid team in Division 1.

The unluckiest player was Trevor England, who scored 5 in the first half vs. Moulders Utd in the Luton News Cup, before being taken off by Dave at half-time! (The team went on to win 12-1).

Champions AC Sportsman won all 20 games, scoring 104 goals and conceding 20. We didn't even come close!

### Third XI

Baggy had figured out how to win leagues!

The Thirds took Division 1 of the Luton Sunday League by storm, winning 14 of 16 games including the first 12 on the trot.

Phil Thompson played in every game but one and scored 28 goals. Only 27 players were used, with Paul Gathern ever-present.

### Fourth XI

Kev Knight's Fourth Team finished 4<sup>th</sup> of 9 teams in the Luton Sunday League Division 2, having been champions three years earlier. The Invitation Cup brought some great results, including 15-2 vs. Red Star Sylhet (Mark Booth scored 4 and Phil Clarke and Craig Brooke 3 each); 11-0 vs. Bramingham (Brooke 4); 16-1 vs. Finn McCouls (Brooke 5) and 2 further 9-1 wins against those teams.

The final of the competition brought a great 3-2 win vs.Dunstable Drivers at 61 FC, with Craig Bryant scoring twice and Craig Brooke the third.

### Saturday XI

Hitchin Reds had joined Lea Sports as their Saturday team under Manager Paul Long. This season passed off relatively peacefully and gave no hint of what was to come, with the team eventually being expelled from Lea Sports for their rowdy behaviour.

On their day, the team could play good football and top scorer Ben Kowalczyk scored 27 times in 22 games as the team finished runners-up in the North Herts Alliance Premier Division. They also played in the Greg Cup Final at Hitchin Town's ground, but played poorly on the night going down 1-0 to first division side Mallard.

### **Under Twelves**

The Club had just one youth team for the 1997-98 season, with Godfrey Knock and Peter Skingley having put together an under 12 side.

Playing in Division 3 of the Chiltern League, the team got off to an awful start with just one draw in their first nine games. Steve Smith's son Lewis made his debut for the Club, as did his other son Chris, who was actually 14 in November 1997. Despite this slight 'oversight' on the managers' part, the goals kept on pouring into our net, the worst defeats being 8-0 away to Evergreen Youth in the County Cup and 10-3 at home to Markyate (both with Chris Shearer in goal).

The team had just one win before Christmas (a 7-1 thumping of Harlington, with Chris Smith scoring twice), although there was a gradual improvement as the season wore on, with 5 wins after Christmas and in the end the team finished 8<sup>th</sup> of 13.

Danny Duggan finished as top scorer with 25 goals, while Richard Knock, who was everpresent, picked up the award for Players' Player.



At the end of the season the Club celebrated its Silver Anniversary with a meal at the Vauxhall Brache, which everyone remembers mostly for the comedian, but also for the fact that halfway through there was a fire alarm and we all had to traipse outside in all our finery into the car park, until the Fire Brigade declared a false alarm.

### 15 YEARS AGO - 2007-08 SEASON

### First XI

Richard Randall's team showed a lack of consistency in their campaign in Division 2. This, coupled with defeats against the bottom four teams, resulted in a disappointing sixth-place finish as Saracens Head took first place.

Chairman Greg Whelan was the only player to play in all 27 games and he was also the top scorer with 14 goals.

### Second XI

Under manager Ed Thomson the Reserves were unlucky only to finish in third place in Division 4 – 4 points behind runners-up Bird and Bush. Home defeats to Bird & Bush (4-5), Magnum Res. (3-4) and Hexton (1-2) were to prove costly.

There was also a disappointing end to a good County Cup run when a December trip to AC Enfield brought a 6-0 defeat in round 4 of the Hertfordshire Junior Cup. Phil Thompson was top scorer with 35 goals, winning the Club's Golden Boot award.

### **Under Sixteens**

Mark Hill's Under Sixteen team also finished third: in the Chiltern Youth division 3, despite being a week away from folding in August due to a lack of players.

One of the high points of the season was achieving six wins on the trot, scoring 31 goals and conceding just 4.

Only Chris Goodrum started all 21 games, top-scoring with 17 goals, although Jack Baggett, Matthew Hill and Josh Pope all figured in 20 games and Matt Day made 19 appearances.

#### **Under Thirteens**

The Under Thirteens, under Greg Nunn, lost players to bigger Clubs before the start of the season, leaving them with a small squad.

With valuable assistance from Coach Adrian Bell, Greg got the boys playing good football and a first league win over Warden Hill, coming from a goal down with ten men to win 2-1 showed the spirit in the side.

In the end a squad of just 15 players achieved fifth place in a tough Chiltern Youth division 1. Top scorers were Cameron Alexander, Danny Butler, Jack Mordecai and Adam Nunn all with nine goals. Surprisingly, only supporters' player Adam Nunn started in every one of the 21 matches.

At the end of the season the Club entered into discussions with Shillington & Gravenhurst United with a view to a merger. S&G ran mini-soccer teams and by a stroke of luck shared the Club's colours of red and black striped shirts and black socks.

From the start of the 2008-09 season Lea Sports PSG was born with teams from Under Eight upwards.

## 5 YEARS AGO - 2017-18 SEASON

By 2017-18, the North Home Counties Sunday League was in turmoil. This league, formerly one of the strongest in the country and at one time having nine divisions, was struggling to retain Clubs and the quality had gone through the floor. Two seasons earlier, in 2015-16, the Sunday First team had folded, so the Reserves stepped up to become the First XI. The following season, 2016-17, this new First XI had finished bottom of Division 2, so started life in Division 3 for the 2017-18 season.

In a division of just 6 teams, playing each other 3 times, the First XI finished runners-up, with Tom Newland top-scoring with 19 of their 67 goals.

Meanwhile, the Saturday XI, under Manager Paul Jones, was continuing its relentless rise in the Bedfordshire County League. Joe Hennem followed up his 36 goals in Division 2 in the previous season with another 32 in Division 1, as the team finished in sixth place of 14 teams. A good run in the Herts Junior County Cup took them through 3 rounds, before a 3-0 fourth-round defeat away at Cottered. The best result of the season was a 6-1 win away at Sandy in October 2017, with Joe Hennem, Ali Moyihaldeen and Nathan Prime each scoring twice.

Two Under 14 teams were playing the 11 vs. 11 format of the game, although both struggled to find any consistency. The Cougars played in Division 3 of the Chiltern Youth League, finishing third of 6 teams. The Panthers managed just 1 win and 1 draw from their 15 games and finished bottom of the Beds Youth Saturday Division 3. Matt Morton managed to top-score for the Panthers, scoring 12 of their 25 goals.

Just one team played the nine-a-side format of the game in 2017-18 – the Under 12 Jaguars, under Manager Alan Scott. Despite great commitment from a team in which Luke Allen top-scored with 12 goals, the team finished 8<sup>th</sup> of 10 teams in the Chiltern Youth Division 3.

It was in the 7-a-side format that the Club had most success. The Under 10 Lions were playing their fourth season together in the Beds Mini-Soccer League. Noah Kirkham scored 19 goals as the team achieved an overall 55% win rate. The Under 10 Lynx also made their debut in the 2017-18 season and, after a slow start, began to find their feet and put a few results together. The team went on to play a further two seasons at 9 v 9 before folding after just one game of the 2020-21 season.

Three Under 9 Pumas teams played 7 vs. 7 football in the 2017-18 season, with all of them recording impressive results. Top of the pile were the Reds, who won 22 of their 27 matches in the Royston Crow Azure Division, under Managers Guy Wiseman and Paul Ford (the same 2 Managers who took charge of the unified Pumas team at Under 14 in 2022-23). Sam Robinson scored 30 of the team's 153 goals. Close behind were the Blacks, playing in the Cherry and Damson Divisions of the Crow League. Jasper Goodwin scored 27 goals for the team run by Graham McNish and Dave Moore. The team won 19 of its 28 games, scoring 103 goals in the process. Last but not least were the Whites, under Pat Kelly and Nick Flinn, playing in the Emerald Division. Naresh Patel scored 22 of the team's 85 goals, as they finished with an overall win rate of 55%.

There were also three teams playing five-a-side football at the Under 8 age group. The Leopards, under Owen Williams and Lee Baxter, achieved a 61% win rate in the Royston Crow Azure Division, with Jake Murray scoring 44 of the team's 107 goals. Also in the Azure Division were the Tigers, under Matt Robbins and Jason Winfield, who achieved an even more impressive win rate of 71%. Max Winfield scored 32 of the team's 129 goals in a great season. The Wildcats played in the Beds Mini-Soccer League under Managers Greg Bartley and James Grey and won just under half of their fixtures, scoring 96 and conceding 100 goals.

Finally, the Bobcats made their first appearance, under Dave Wright and Haz Patel, playing at Under 7 in the Royston Crow Burgundy Division. Thomas Flinn scored 42 of the team's 119 goals, as they won 16 and drew 1 of their 25 fixtures.

## FIFTY YEARS ON - 2022-23 SEASON

Fifty years after its formation in 1973, Lea Sports ran 15 teams, from Under Sevens to Veterans, in seven different leagues across Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire.

For the Saturday 1<sup>st</sup> XI it was probably the cruellest season of all, especially given that this was the best Saturday team ever to represent the Club. For most of the season, they led the way in the Beds County League Division 1, with only Totternhoe Reserves managing to hang on to their coat tails. In short, it was the 2 games against Totternhoe which decided the season – we lost both: 2-4 at home and 3-5 away, however, the circumstances in which the top spot changed hands was particularly hard to take.

As the season moved from April to May, the team was 8 points clear of Totternhoe, who had 4 games left. We knew that victories in the last 2 games – both at home – would ensure the title was ours. Unfortunately, the fixture planners decided that the penultimate game should take place just 3 days after a gruelling semi-final in the East Beds Charity Cup (which we lost on penalties). This game ended in a 0-0 draw after a tough match against a robust Buffs FC. Most of the lads then played for their Sunday sides, before facing in-form Clifton in the final match on Bank Holiday Monday. We battled hard and after 75 minutes were winning 2-1, but then the effort of 4 games in 6 days told, and we conceded two late goals to lose 3-2. It was a heartbreaking blow.

Even then, Totternhoe had to win 3 of their last 4 games to overhaul us. Just to rub salt in the wound, Totternhoe's first 2 opponents failed to put a team out against them, so they were gifted 6 points before winning the third fixture 1-0, with a 90<sup>th</sup>-minute goal, to take the title (They lost their final game 6-1). A depleted and dispirited Lea Sports team then had to play a tough Centenary Cup semi-final away to Cranfield and crashed out 3-0. It was ironic that Cranfield were the first team to halt our winning start to the season, coming back from 2-0 down to draw 2-2, and were then the team to administer the *coup de grâce*.

The Veterans XI, playing home games in Whitwell, also achieved a runners-up spot to seal promotion to the Premier Division of the Herts Vets Super League. In the end, they were the only team to beat runaway winners London Maccabi, so the lads could look back on the season with pride. The Sunday XI started their Hitchin Sunday League Division 2 campaign slowly, with many inconsistent performances. They improved through the season, however, and reached the Final of the George John Memorial Trophy, securing a safe mid-table position in the league.

The fourth of our adult sides – the Saturday Reserves – used no fewer than 48 players, but struggled to find any consistency and ended the season on a 9-game losing run in the Beds County League Division 3, finishing  $11^{th}$  of 13 teams.

In the Youth Section, the Under 15 Lions had a great season, winning the championship of the Royston Crow League Division 2. They only lost 2 league games and were unbeaten in their last 14 games, including four 4-1 wins in a row either side of Christmas 2022. Our Under 14 Pumas and Under 12 Bobcats – playing in the top division of their respective leagues (Beds Youth Saturday and Chiltern Junior Sevens) – both struggled to get a full squad out each week, as the pull of rugby, hockey, school and county fixtures all took their toll. Both teams could beat anyone on their day – but both finished at the foot of their divisions. There were 3 Under 13 Cougars teams in action, but they too struggled at times to get their full squads out. The Cougars Reds had the best season, finishing 4<sup>th</sup> in the Royston Crow Division 1. The Under 11 Jaguars, playing in the Chiltern Sevens League, continued to develop, winning over 60% of their games, while the Under 9 Sabres, playing 7 vs.7 won just under half their games.

At 5 vs. 5, two Under 8 teams played – the Blacks (in their second season) and a new Reds team, both of which improved as the year went on. The Under 7 Panthers made their debut, with top-scorer Alex Woodward scoring a remarkable 45 goals in his first season.

## THE GOALSCORERS

If you mention the word 'goalscoring' to most people at Lea Sports, they will say 'Phil Thompson' and rightly so, but there were scorers before Phil, who didn't make his debut until 1982.

In those ten years before Phil Thompson, the scoring honours were shared between **Dave Pymont** and **Phil Clarke**. By the end of the 1982-83 season Dave had scored 161 goals in 237 appearances and Phil, who joined in 1974, had 138 goals in 181 games.

Dave went on to play 350 games altogether over 20 years and finished with 217 goals. Phil Clarke played in each of 26 seasons, making 528 appearances in all and scoring 427 goals.

## Phil Thompson – Goalscorer Extraordinaire

Appearances: 631 (+ 36 as substitute); Goals: 680

Phil made his debut for Lea Sports at the age of 17 on 21<sup>st</sup> November 1982 scoring for the Third Team in a 2-2 draw with Toddington Farmers. He would go on to score a further 679 goals including 347 for the First Team. He is 253 goals ahead of second top scorer Phil Clarke.

He has been top scorer for the First Team on nine occasions, beginning with 20 goals in 1989-90 and ending with 23 goals in 2004-05. He was also top scorer for the Reserves three times between 2007 and 2010, scoring 37 goals in the 2007-08 season to finish as the North Home Counties' top goalscorer. In 1988-89 he was the Third Team's top scorer with 14 – and again in 1997-98 with 28; in 1998-99 with 45 and again in 1999-2000 with 24. He was even top scorer for the Veterans in 1995-96 with 17.

Phil's scoring feats are well-documented, but I repeat a few here: his record in one match was seven on 6<sup>th</sup> November 1988 vs. Holy Ghost at Leagrave Park, in a match Lea Sports won 17-0. In the return fixture on 18<sup>th</sup> December, Phil scored his 100th goal for the Club.

Phil reached 500 goals in the 2002-03 season (the Club's 30<sup>th</sup> Anniversary year) playing for Steve Baggett's First Team in Division 2, in a season when he was also voted as Players' Player.

On 30<sup>th</sup> March 2008, playing for the Reserves against Dynamo Old Boys at Lewsey Park, Phil needed one goal to reach 600—we needn't have worried as he scored the first of his 4 goals that evening within the first two minutes in a 6-0 win.

In 2012-13 Phil turned out once for the Vets in their County Cup match away to Hadley – but he still managed to score 3 times in that game.

## (THE OTHER GOALSCORERS!)

Apart from the three extraordinary scorers mentioned above, there have been other players who have managed spectacular scoring feats – if maybe not over the length of time that Clarke, Pymont and Thompson managed.

The charts on the following pages will list all those players scoring more than 70 goals in the 11 vs. 11 format of the game and more than 60 in the other formats of the game, but I'll just mention a few of the best here. As in all these articles, I've tried to remember and mention the most worthy examples, but if I've missed someone along the way – my apologies!


Matt Kenneford made his debut for the Under Ten team on 30<sup>th</sup> August 1998. He scored 41 goals that season, as the team finished as Runners-Up in the Chiltern Youth Division 2. Matt stayed with the Club for 5 seasons, scoring a total of 226 goals in 137 games, including 74 in the amazing 2001-02 season, when the Under Thirteens again finished as Runners-Up in the Chiltern Youth Division 2. After scoring 7 goals in a league game vs. Sacred Heart at the end of September, Matt scored 8 the following week in a 9-8 win over Albion Youth – after extra time! – in the Herts County Cup.


The 'Golden Boot' award for the top 11-a-side goalscorer was introduced in that season to recognise Matt Kenneford's amazing feat.

**Tom Newland** played his first match for the Sunday Reserves on 28<sup>th</sup> September 2008 and is still playing for that team now some 15 years later. (The Reserves became the First XI in 2016-17 after the collapse of the old First team). Tom has an incredibly consistent record over those years, only dipping below double figures of goals in two seasons; between 2009 and 2021 he was top scorer for every season bar one (when Phil Thompson played a season for the Reserves). In total, Tom has now scored 218 goals in 246 matches – a strike rate of 88.6%.

**Keith Bannister** played 3 seasons for the Sunday 3<sup>rd</sup> team between 1983 and 1986, scoring 66 goals in 63 games. Despite many attempts to get Keith to play for the Second and First teams, he steadfastly refused, and all but 6 of his appearances were for the Thirds, where he enjoyed being the big fish in a relatively small pond!

In the 16 seasons between 1989 and 2005, Phil Thompson was top scorer for the Sunday First XI on nine occasions, but he didn't always have it his own way (although, don't forget that between 1997 and 2000 Phil was top scorer for the Sunday 3<sup>rd</sup> XI...). In two of the other 7 seasons, **John Temple** (the 'Serial Killer') was top scorer notching 21 goals in 1995-96 and 19 two years later. In the end John Temple scored 167 goals, of which 67 were for the Saturday First XI, over 276 games between 1992 and 1999.





Despite joining the Club in 1982, Phil Thompson did not become top scorer for the Sunday First XI until 1989-90. This is mainly due to the appearance of 3 great scorers between 1984 and 1989: **Mark Doyle** was one of the most complete footballers ever to play for the Club, scoring 74 goals in 80 apearances over 3 seasons; **Alan Dawson** formed a great partnership with Phil up front and top scored in 1986-87 and 1988-89 — Al would eventually score 175 goals over 403 games in 18 seasons. Then there was **Willy O'Leary**, who got lost if he was outside the opposition's six-yard box. A great opportunist striker, Will scored 56 goals in 54 games in two spells for what was in effect his second club.

I'm going to give a mention here to my son **Lewis Smith**. Lewis made his club debut for the Under 12s in 1997 but only really played seriously for Lea Sports for one season, when, in 2006-07, he was top scorer and Players' Player for the Sunday 2<sup>nd</sup> XI. In that season he scored 29 goals in 23 games, including a great winning goal in a Reserve Cup match against AC Sportsman Reserves, who were two divisions higher at the time. Lewis won the Golden Boot that year.

Another player who maybe didn't score as many as he might have, was **Jamie Richards**. Jamie made his debut for the Under Fourteens in January 1997 and went on to make 429 appearances, of which 254 were for the Sunday First XI. He scored 186 goals in total, but only 29 in his last nine seasons with the Club. Jamie was First team top scorer for 2 consecutive seasons between 2005 and 2007 in the North Home Counties Division 2 in the team managed by Greg Whelan and Richard Randall.

After making his début for the Saturday First XI on 9<sup>th</sup> August 2014 against Flitwick Town in a friendly in Pirton, **Joe Hennem** has gone on to score 169 goals in 207 appearances, joining the 200 Club this year. Joe has won the Golden Boot, for top 11 vs. 11 scorer, on three occasions, in 2015-16 with 20 goals, in 2017-18 with 32 and in 2020-21 with 23. Joe continues to score consistently at a high level in the Bedfordshire County League Division One. He scored another 23 goals this year, just a few less than top-scorer Milton Tomlinson-Dennis.

Jon Whitehead: Jon is a one-team man, who scored twice on his debut in a 3-3 draw away at Lilley Rangers in a Division 5 match for the Reserves on 2<sup>nd</sup> September 2001. He went on to make a total of 393 appearances over 21 seasons, scoring 119 goals. All but 3 of Jon's appearances were for the Reserves (which later became the First XI) under Managers Archie Conway, Ed Thomson, Steve Baggett and Paul Maclennan. Although he only hit double figures in 2 of those seasons, Jon's consistency over the years has earned him a place in our list of goalscorers. Jon was Manager's Player for the Reserves in the 2007-08 season.



Matt Morton: Matt is included here, although most of his goals came for the youth teams, because he is still scoring! His début came in September 2010, playing for the Under Sevens. He scored double figures right up to 2016 and the Under 12s (111 goals in 232 appearances). In the 2016-17 season he switched to 11-a-side football, playing on Saturdays for the Under 13 Panthers and on Sundays for the Under 13 Cougars. That season brought a total of 75 games in 42 appearances, earning him the Golden Boot for that year. In all Matt has now scored 205 goals in 327 appearances.

**Robert O'Dell:** Rob's five seasons with the Club began in September 1992 at Under 13, when he scored 22 goals for a team that finished 11<sup>th</sup> of 13 teams in the Chiltern Youth League Division 1, playing for his dad Dave O'Dell. In 1998-99 he switched to the Sunday First XI, playing in the North Home Counties Premier Division, and top-scored again with 17 goals in a team which finished second-to-bottom. In his five seasons, Rob scored a total of 160 goals in 137 appearances — a strike rate of 116.8%. He stayed in the Premier Division with Old Moat House where he continued to bang in the goals!

### YOUTH GOALSCORERS

There have been a number of outstanding goalscorers in the youth and mini-soccer teams (probably too many to mention all of them.)

Ben L'Honoré played 4 full seasons between 1998 and 2002 for Godfrey Knock's teams from Under 13 through to Under 16. He scored 135 goals in 92 appearances, including 51 in the 1999-2000 season (two years before the Golden Boot was introduced). In the 2001-02 season, Ben's goals helped the Under 16 Reds to the final of the Royston Crow League Cup, where they came up against County Cup Winners and hot favourites Stevenage Borough. At half time the Reds were losing 2-1, but a Tai Kang header brought them level. Ben then scored with 15 minutes to go to give Lea Sports a 3-2 lead, which they managed to hold on to until deep in injury time, when Stevenage forced an equaliser to take the game into extra time. In the first period of extra time, Richard Knock was brought down in the penalty area. Adam Cox took his time and hit the back of the Colts' net. We were willing the side to hold on and all was going well, but the ref just kept playing. Two minutes into injury time in the second period of extra time Stevenage again drew level at 4-4 to take the match to penalties. With Chris Gear sidelined with a knee injury, Adam Cox took over in goal and the teams exchanged shots. It came down to the last two kicks — unfortunately Ben saw his kick saved and Stevenage lifted the trophy by 3 penalties to 2.

Jamie Williams played from Under 7 to Under 11 between September 2014 and 2019 and scored 132 goals in 102 games, but even these exploits have been eclipsed by brother Rory, who made his début for the Under 7s in September 2016. Rory played at Under 13 this season and so far has scored a total of 278 goals in 170 games (264 of those goals in 149 mini-soccer matches).

Former players **Ben and Sam Bayley** both scored over 100 mini-soccer goals. Ben played from 2010 to 2016 and scored 165 goals in 192 games, including 38 goals in 2010-11; while Sam played between 2011 and 2017 scoring 122 goals in 81 games, including 48 in 2012-13. **Louis Lomas** scored 95 goals in 61 games between 2008 and 2010.

More recently, we have seen **Derek Ezeka** score 181 goals in 105 games between 2017 and 2022. **Ethan Whybrow** scored 60 goals in 37 games between 2022 and 2022 and **Zac Wright** scored 152 goals in 124 appearances – sadly all those players have now moved on, but new prospects are appearing: just this season **Alex Woodward** has begun his Lea Sports life with 45 goals in 17 matches for the Under 7 Panthers.

## (NOT) THE GOALSCORERS!

With over 2,300 players having appeared in a Lea Sports shirt, it's obviously a very difficult task to pick out just a few to mention. There are clearly lots of good players who have appeared for the Club, but I've tried below not just to list good players, but also those who stuck around for a long time!

We have our '200 Club', which is a list of players who have made 200 or more appearances – the full list is later in the magazine – but here (in no particular order) are a few excellent players:

Russ Sheppard: Russ made his first appearance as substitute for the Sunday 1<sup>st</sup> XI on 15<sup>th</sup> November 1987 in a home game in the North Home Counties Division 3 vs. Markyate. He played in most games for the rest of that season and was pivotal in the following season, when the team won promotion to Division 2. Quite skinny and light on his feet, it was always difficult to get the ball off him and his control of the midfield was great. Russ was First team Player's Player in 1989-90. In all, Russ scored 119 goals in 240 appearances over 8 seasons with the Club.





**Kev Connolly**: Irishman Kev Connolly was another talented midfielder who could take charge of a game when he was in the mood. Kev actually made his debut for the Club playing in a Third team friendly at home to Luton College in October 1989, and played most of the rest of that season for the Reserves in the NH Counties Division 5. However, in 1990-91 he played in all but 2 matches for Keith Lee's First XI which won the Division 3 championship. He might be best remembered for travelling on one of the foreign tours on his brother's out-of-date southern Irish passport! In all Kev made 236 appearances for the Club over 9 seasons, scoring 32 goals.

**Micky Justin**: Micky Justin played seven seasons for Lea Sports, with all but 3 of his 158 appearances being in the Sunday First XI — many of them as Captain. He made his debut for the Club in Division 2 of the NH Counties in 1991 and was still there when the team made its debut in Division 1 in the 1996-97 season. He was First team Players' Player in 1992-93. Micky was just one of the Justin brothers, with Keith, Steve and, notoriously, Ricky also making a handful of appearances for the Club. His football legacy continues, even after his sad passing in April 2020, with his son James playing at Leicester City. At the time I wrote: "Mick was not only one of the best players to wear a Lea Sports shirt, he was also one of the nicest guys you could hope to meet."





**Richard Randall:** Rich made his Club début for the Sunday First XI in a NH Counties Division 2 match vs. King William IV under Manager Steve Baggett in January 2004. He is still playing this season, having made 14 appearances for the Veterans in the Herts Vets Super League in a total of 389 appearances for the Club. (It's not true that we give him an appearance every time he walks his dog past a Sunday game!)

Always a solid defender, Rich has scored 30 goals in that time. He made most of his appearances for the Sunday First team (237 in all) and was First team Manager between 2006 and 2013 (2006-07 jointly with Greg Whelan), having been named as First team Manager's Player in 2004-05. He keeps telling us it's his last season, but we just don't believe it!



Bobby McGrath: Bobby was another of those players who you always wanted on your team and not the opposition. Strong, fearless and sometimes quite bonkers, Bobby just seems to have been around for ever. He is another of those players who made their Club début playing for the Third team. This time in a Luton Sunday League Division 1 match in September 1991 against Strawplaiters – just the sort of game Bobby would have relished! In the end, Bobby made 605 appearances for Lea Sports (and probably as many for St.Joes) between 1991 and his 9 appearances for the Veterans in 2021-22. In a 30-year career, having played with a hernia, broken arm and various other injuries. Bobby was Third team Players' Player and Manager's Player in 1993-94, Reserves Players' Player in 1995-96, First team Players' Player in 1998-99 and First team Manager's Player in 2001-02, notching up 74 goals over the years.

Rick Vipers: Probably not one of the certainly not as good up-front as he players who you definitely wanted team friendly away at St. Albans went on to play 572 games for the the Reserves and 121 for the First when Rick made his one and only mostly as a defender, Rick scored the Reserves in 1983-84, was their Manager's Player in 1986-87. He



most naturally-talented footballers — and always thought he was! — Rick was one of those on your team. Rick's first match was a Third Round Table in October 1980. After that he Club, including 170 in the Third team, 268 for XI, in a career that continued until August 2003, appearance in the Saturday First XI. Playing 58 goals in total. Rick was player/manager of Player's Player in 1981-82 and was their managed the Third team in 1994-95.

**Keith Lee:** Keith will get a mention later on as one of the Club's administrators over the years, but he fully deserves a mention as a player as well. He made his début for the Club in a Reserve fixture vs. Royal Oak Reserves in the NH Counties Division 7 in August 1978. Between then and his last appearance for Lea Sports – in a Veterans game vs. Pirton Casuals in September 2006, some 28 years later, he made a total of 432 appearances, of which 328 were for the Sunday First XI. He was First team Players' Player in 1978-79 and Manager's Player in 1984-85.





Archie Conway: Archie was already in his late twenties when he made his debut for the Club and scored in a 2-2 draw for the Third team vs. Luton Teachers' Club in October 1981. Even so, he was to play for another 32 years, making his final appearance in a Veterans' match vs. Harpenden Rovers in October 2013, alongside Phil Thompson and Bobby McGrath. Archie made 412 appearances for the Reserves alone, plus another 79 for the First team and 137 for the Thirds in an overall total of 645 games for the Club. Archie never quite made it to 50 goals, scoring his 49<sup>th</sup> and last goal for the Club in a 9-1 win for the Reserves in April 2007. He was player/manager of the Reserves between 2000 and 2002 and was Manager's Player for the Reserves in 1993-94 and for the Third team in 1997-98. Archie was First team Players' Player in 1985-86, Reserve team Players' Player in 1991-92 and 1993-94 and Third team Players' Player in 1995-96 and 1996-97.

Archie is an Honorary Vice-President of the Club.

**Rob Hennem:** Rob made his Club debut for the Saturday 1<sup>st</sup> team on 23<sup>rd</sup> August 2014, coming on as a substitute in a 4-0 win over Clifton in the East Beds Junior Charity Cup. His 200<sup>th</sup> appearance came on 18<sup>th</sup> December 2021 in an away fixture against Flitwick Town Reserves in the Beds County League Division 1. Rob has scored 29 goals in his total of 241 appearances so far and has led the team to the Final of the Beds County Centenary Cup in 2021-22 and runners-up spot in the Beds County League Division 1 this season.



**Kelvin Callow:** Kelv was one of the original cohort of junior schoolteachers who established Lea Sports in 1973. He played 45 times in the first 2 seasons, and went on to make a total of 592 appearances over 26 seasons, ending with an appearance for the Veterans, alongside Keith Lee and Phil Clarke, in 2000. A loyal servant to the Club, Kelv was the first player to reach the landmark of 500 appearances, fortunately on a day when both the First and Third teams were playing at Stopsley Regional Sports Centre on 28<sup>th</sup> March 1993 in the Club's Silver Anniversary season. Kelvin was First team Manager's Player in 1983-84, Second team Manager's Player in 1985-86 and 1987-88 and Third team Manager's Player in 1991-92 and 1992-93. He was First team Players' Player in 1979-80, and Second team Players' Player in 1985-86. Kelvin is an Honorary Vice-President of the Club.



## THE INDIVIDUALS

**Steve Baggett:** What can you say about Steve Baggett (Baggie) except that he was a Winner?

Baggie was yet another Third team débutant, playing 23 times for them in the 1991-92 season in the Luton Sunday League Division 1, before taking over as team manager for the 1996-97 season, leading the team to 4<sup>th</sup> place and winning the league's CBS Cup. The following season they were Champions, winning 16 of their 22 league games. In 1998-99 they finished as runners-up, despite Phil Thompson scoring 45 goals, but they won the League's Challenge Cup and were finalists in the TT Trophy. His final season in charge of the Thirds saw them take 3<sup>rd</sup> place in the South Beds Division 1 and lose in the Division One Cup Final.



In 2000-01 Baggie began his first of five years as First team Manager, wiining about half his games in a North Home Counties Division 3 season which was in the end washed away. The following year, another 31 goals from Phil Thompson took them to the Division 3 Championship, followed by 3 seasons in Division 2, when they finished 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup>. Baggie took charge of the Reserves for one season in 2010-11, when his top scorer was – you guessed it – Phil Thompson, with 21 goals – the team finishing in 6<sup>th</sup> place in Division 3.

Baggie also found time to play 262 games for the Club, scoring 59 goals, including one memorable equaliser in injury time for the Fourth team against the infamous Railway Tavern in a midweek game in April in Pirton, which deprived the Tavern of the Championship.

Steve Baggett is one of the Club's Honorary Vice-Presidents.

Steve's son Jack, who first played for the Club at Under 12 in 2002, has also made 289 appearances and scored 14 goals more than his dad. He played his last game as a sub for the Sunday First XI in April 2022, after over 20 years with the Club.

**Hugh Byrne**: Hugh first played for the Club in a Reserves match towards the end of the 1987-88 season and made his final and 135<sup>th</sup> appearance in a Veterans match in April 2017 against Letchwoth Eagles, on a day which saw Richard Randall play in goal (we lost 8-2!).

It won't be as a footballer, however, that Hugh will be remembered – we always knew that he preferred the odd-shaped ball – but for his contribution to the Club, not only as chief entertainments officer on the foreign tours, but for his unstinting support for the Club for the last 40 years through his company Form I.T. Solutions (formerly Premier Computer Supplies).

Since the early eighties Hugh must have given many thousands of pounds to the Club and any number of teams have sported the 'Form IT' or 'Premier Computer Supplies' logos on their shirts. Even this season, Hugh made a contribution towards the Golden Anniversary coats given out to all officials and players.

Thanks for everything, Hugh!

**Greg Whelan:** Greg was no mean player, making 345 appearances and scoring 101 goals, over 16 seasons between 2002 and 2018. He was also extremely active, however, off the pitch, sharing the First team Manager's position with Richard Randall in the 2005-06 and 2006-07 seasons and leading the team to a top-half position in Division 2 on both occasions.

Not only that, but Greg was Club Chairman for four seasons between 2005 and 2009 – a period which culminated in the First team finishing as runners-up in Division 2 in the 2008-09 season. In that season, Greg also served as the Club's first ever Club Welfare Officer.


Mark Turner: Mark joined the Club in September 1984 and played 236 games in all, split fairly evenly between First, Second and Third teams. In 1989-90 Dave Blake chose him as his Manager's Player for the Second team. Although usually a defender, Mark was a utility player who would play wherever needed, including taking the keeper's gloves on many occasions. Mark was also Chairman of the Club for three seasons between 1991 and 1994, just before the Club moved to Pirton. Mark also served with Luton Rugby Club and as an officer on the Luton Sunday League Committee.



**Paul Maclennan:** Macca joined the Club in December 2003 and seems to be one of those people who has been around forever! Another 'one-team' man, he has started 168 games for the Sunday First team (formerly the Sunday Second team) and has appeared as a substitute no fewer than 115 times. For the 2011-12 season, Macca took over the Manager's role for the Sunday Reserves, then playing in the North Home Counties Division 3. Four more seasons were to follow in the NH Counties – 2 in Division 2 and 2 in Division 3 – until, in 2015-16, the First team folded and the Second team became the First team. Three more seasons in the NH Counties followed,

including the mad season of 2018-19, when the team finished as runners-up despite scoring 136 goals (50 of them in 2 games against the hapless Wheelwrights Arms). The team then moved to the Hitchin Sunday League in 2019-20 (just in time for the pandemic!) and has played the last 3 seasons in that league, so Macca has now completed twelve seasons as team manager. Macca was Manager's Player for the Second team in 2006-07 and 2008-09.

**Ed Thomson:** Before Macca took over as Second team Manager, Baggie took charge for a season, but before that the team was managed for seven seasons by Ed Thomson, who joined the Club in August 2000. Ed was also really a 'one-team' man, making all but 11 of his 318 appearances for the Second team, scoring 21 times in total. Ed took over a team that was struggling in Division 5 of the NH Counties, but took them to 4<sup>th</sup> place in his first season, with Jamie Richards top-scoring with 23 goals. Jamie again top-scored in 2004-05 and the team finished third, which earned them promotion to Division 4. A tough first season in Division 4 followed with brother Ben top-scoring with just 6 goals, but the following year the team finished 4<sup>th</sup>, with Lewis Smith scoring 28, and the



year after improved again to 3<sup>rd</sup> place, with Phil Thompson scoring 35 times. In 2008-09, Phil banged in another 34 goals as the team scored 100 goals in taking the Division 4 championship. They also reached the Final of the League Challenge Cup that season. Ed's final season in charge (2009-10) saw a steady finish in Division 3, with Tom Newland appearing as top scorer for the first time.

Ed was Second team Manager's Player in 2010-11, with brother Ben taking the accolade in 2001-02 and ten years later in 2011-12. Brother Jim Thomson was also Manager's Player in 2004-05. Ed was Players' Player in 2004-05, with Ben taking the honour in 2003-04, 2005-06 and 2008-09.

Laurence Freed: Although playing just 50 games for the Club, between August 1991 and an appearance for the Veterans in 2000, Laurence Freed was an important figure off the pitch. His managerial career started inauspiciously in the 1993-94 season, when, as leader of the Sunday Fourth team, he finished 7<sup>th</sup> of 9 teams in the Luton Sunday League Division 2. The season ended well, however, as the team made it through to the Final of the League's Invitation Cup. This was held at St. Albans City's ground on 25<sup>th</sup> April 1994 and the Club hired a mini-bus to mark the occasion! Top scorer Sandy Muir got stuck on the M25 (I think it was) and never made it to the game. In the end the team lost 1-0, but it was a brilliant night!



The following season, 1994-95, Lol took over as Second team Manager and 'The Invincibles' were born! Not only did they finish top of Division 5, winning 16 and drawing 1 of their 20 matches, but they also reached the Final of the Bedfordshire Centenary Cup, which was played at Cranfield United's ground on St. George's Day, 23<sup>rd</sup> April 1995. The whole squad turned up in shirts and ties, sporting Red Roses to mark the day. It had been a tough run-in to the Final, however. Many of the lads also played for the Saturday side and were playing midweek fixtures to get the season finished. The Saturday team had fixtures on the 22<sup>nd</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup> April! Despite being almost dead on their feet, the team played out a 0-0 draw after extra time against Potton and the game went to penalties. Both teams scored 4 of their 5 penalties and it went to sudden death. Potton scored first and as student Alex Houghton walked out to take his penalty I asked him how he normally took penalties – did he blast them or place them? He replied that he'd never taken one before – and then put his kick over the bar.

In 1995-96, Lol began the first of 3 seasons as First team Manager in the North Home Counties Division 2. Three seasons later they won promotion to the Premier Division for the first time in their history and Laurence Freed's legacy was complete. Straight after the Club's move to Pirton, Lol took over as Chairman, for 3 seasons from 1996-1999. He is one of the Honorary Vice-Presidents of the Club.

**Keith Lee:** As well as his distinguished playing career for the Club (described above), Keith Lee was a major player off the field. He was Chairman on four separate occasions: from 1989-1991, from 1994-1996, in 1999-2000, and from 2001-2005 — a total of 9 years altogether. He was also Club Secretary for 2 years, between 1983 and 1985. Keith was joint First team Manager between 1979 and 1983 — firstly with Elwyn Owen, then Phil Holmes, then John Forsyth, and was sole manager for 2 seasons, between 1990 and 1992, winning the Division 3 championship in his first season in charge. Keith is an Honorary Vice-President of the Club, as is his wife Sue for her services to the Netball team.

Phil Toyer: Phil has been involved with Lea Sports for nigh on 15 years now and has been the Club Chairman since 2009. He also managed our Under 13 team in the Chiltern Youth League Division 1 in the 2009-10 season. Even prior to that, however, he and I used to run Saturday Soccer sessions for 5 and 6 year-olds to get them started on playing football. Phil coached the kids, while I made the teas and dished out biscuits from the now-famous biscuit tin! We hoped each year to be able to start a new Under 7 team from these sessions and most seasons we succeeded.

Apart from his Chairmanship, his main involvement, of course, is as the Head of Youth Football, which means he has overall responsibility for the coaching and development of all the players in our youth teams. Much of the Club's current ethos and approach to playing football is because of Phil's philosophy for young players. Phil is just completing his 14<sup>th</sup> season as Chairman, making him the longest-serving Chairman in the Club's history.



Nathan Moorhouse: Nathan joined the Club in September 2014 when the current Saturday First team squad formed, and has been a part of the fixtures and fittings ever since. Ryan Durrant was team Manager for the first season (2014-15), and took the team to the runners-up spot in Division 3 of the Bedfordshire County League. Nathan took over from Ryan the next season as the team tried its luck in Division 2. The team finished a creditable 7<sup>th</sup> in its first season, with Joe Hennem winning his first Golden Boot with 20 goals. The following season (2017-18) Joe increased his tally to 36 goals (although not enough to win the Golden Boot as Matt Morton had his 75-goal season) and Nathan led the team to 3<sup>rd</sup> in the table and promotion to Division 1. Two steady mid-table finishes followed, with Joe winning his second Golden Boot with 32 goals in 2017-18. A couple of pandemic-hit seasons were followed in 2021-22 by a top five finish, with Joe Hennem again leading the scoring with 13 goals. In 2022-23, Nathan gave up the managerial role, but the foundations had been laid for a serious assault on the Division 1 Championship.

Nathan has always taken an active part in every aspect of the Club, including an important role in the pitch maintenance program the Club has been involved in for the last 4 years. He was elected as an Honorary Vice-President of the Club in May 2023.

Catherine Cardy: The Club appointed its first Welfare Officer, Greg Whelan, in 2008, but the role was not clearly defined in those days. In recent years, not only have the responsibilities of the Club Welfare Officer (CWO) become better defined, but they have also become more arduous as the football authorities have placed increasing importance on DBS checks, safeguarding and first-aid rules. Catherine has committed fully to the position for the last seven years and is an extremely valuable member of the executive team.



**Steve Smith:** I suppose that, since this is a record of the Club, I should give a mention to myself – something I don't often do. Most people believe that I have been with the Club since the year dot, but that's not true. In fact, as the Club was being established in 1973 I was away at Uni. After my graduation in the long, hot summer of 1976, I moved to Cheltenham where I worked for GCHQ as a linguist for some time. It was here in Cheltenham that I probably reached the pinnacle of my football fame. Each week the local rag, the Cheltenham Chronicle, would print team lists for every club in the top 2 divisions of the local league. So, there I was: S.Smith, No.2, Smith's Industries FC. Cheltenham and District League Division 2. The height of fame!

Homesickness brought me back to Luton in 1977, where I joined Royal Oak FC. I don't remember anything about the football, just that we used to meet up in a back room of the George II pub in Bute Street, Luton. Every time it rained, the water would come through the roof and sparks would fly from the jukebox! Happy days (if a little dangerous!)

Towards the end of the year, my schoolteacher mates persuaded me to transfer to Lea Sports and I played my first match for the Sunday Reserves on 4<sup>th</sup> December 1977 against Globe Sports in the NH Counties Division 7. I can't have done that badly, as we drew 0-0 against a team that had walloped us 5-0 a fortnight before. They put me in the First team and I never really looked back. I always had problems with my knees and as time went on I had to miss more and more games, although I did manage 178 in total (over 100 for the First team). In the summer of 1991 during pre-season training, trying for another comeback at the age of 37, I ruptured the anterior cruciate ligament in my left knee and my playing days were over.

I had already been involved in the Club administration, having served as Club Secretary for 4 seasons from 1979 to 1983 (the latter 2 as treasurer as well), but now I concentrated on the off-the-field activities in the Club. My second stint as Secretary lasted 12 seasons, from 1989 to 2000, then Baggie took over for 2 years, before I resumed the role for the 2002-03 season. In all, I have been Club Secretary for 37 of the Club's 50 seasons. As I said, I was treasurer for 2 seasons in the 1980s, but took over again in 2002-03 and have done that job since then – 23 seasons in all. The Club elected me as its President in 1991 and, apart from one season when Brian Swain from the Luton News was elected to the honorary position, I have held that position ever since (31 seasons in all).




Pitch marking in Pirton with Lol Freed and Kev Boxall – late 1990s

I won the 'Ivan Lawrence Clubman' award for 12 seasons between 1982 and 1999 – then they stopped awarding it!

I took over as First team Manager in 1984-85, with the team in Division 5 of the North Home Counties. We finished fifth in that first season, but moved up to third in the following year (with Mark Doyle scoring 55 goals over the 2 seasons), which earned us promotion to Division 4.

In 1986-87, we repeated the feat, finishing third and securing promotion to the dizzy heights of Division 3 for the first time. In those days, it was quite a step up: not only were there better teams, but you switched from playing in the lower divisions' cup – the Luton News Cup – to playing in the cup for the top 4 divisions – the Whitbread Cup.

Our first cup tie was at home to Hexton, then in Division 1. I remember that Alan Dawson brought along his mate Barry Pearce who played as sweeper: he was outstanding at the back, and even got forward to score the winner in a great 2-1 win. In Round 2 we faced an even greater challenge as we were drawn at home to Luton Way, who were a good Premier Division side at the time. I put five across the back and just Will O'Leary up in the opposition box. By half-time we were doing pretty well – we were just 1-0 down and Will had hit the post. As the game went on, however, the gap in class and fitness became more and more apparent, and we eventually lost 10-1. Nevertheless, we achieved 22 points and a respectable 7<sup>th</sup> place in the league. The following year, 1988-89 we battled our way to 4<sup>th</sup> place, with Alan Dawson top-scoring.

In my sixth season in charge, 1989-90, we struggled for consistency, and although Phil Thompson top-scored, we found ourselves in a relegation battle. It all came down to the last game: we needed a point from our last game at home to Harvest Home to stay up. Harvest Home, however, needed to win to take the Championship. It was an incredibly tense game – we went 1-0 down, but then equalised through Kev Boxall in the second half. The players were dead on their feet, but kept repelling attack after attack. In the end, with 2 minutes to go, we failed to clear a corner, the ball ricocheted around the six yard box and was poked into the corner of the net. We lost 2-1 and were relegated. I decided it was enough for me and resigned as Manager – Keith Lee took over and promptly won the Division 3 championship the next season!

In 1991-92, I took over from Dave Blake as Manager of the Second team for one season, back in Division 5. We had a pretty good season, finishing 4<sup>th</sup>, with Phil Clarke top scorer with 21 goals. Two years later, in 1993-94, I had an eventful season as Manager of the Third team. We got off to a great start with 3 wins from 3, then met Dunstable First & Last, who were in second place in the league. Unfortunately, the referee failed to turn up and we agreed that a Dunstable official could take charge. Big mistake! Half-way through the second half, with the score at 0-0, Neil 'Geordie' Hebron went on a run from deep in his own half and ended up in the opposition penalty area, where he was unceremoniously hacked down. 'No penalty. Play on', waved the referee and the game finished 0-0. In the end, those 2 points lost cost us the Championship. You live and learn!

Apart from a season helping to manage the Under 18s with Micky Justin in 1995-96, that was the end of my managerial career. I'm very proud of the fact that the Club has won many awards for good

administration and fair play – they can mean as much as success on the field. And there have been a few personal awards along the way: 1982-83 and 1988-89 Luton Parks Adult Members' Trophy; 1992-93 my first Long Service Award, from Luton Borough Council; 1993-94 the Ron Cox (Secretary's) Award from the North Home Counties; 2011-12 Long Service Award from Hertfordshire FA and 2012-13 League Administration Award from the Beds Mini Soccer League.

The time seems to have gone by so quickly – it really is hard to believe that the Club is 50 years old. So, I guess the next milestone is whether I can stick around until 2027 to celebrate my own Golden Anniversary with the Club. We'll just have to see ...



## **LADIES**

Season 1994-95 saw the appearance of **Lea Sports Ladies** who played in Division 2 of the Eastern Region Women's Football League. Without a designated Manager and lacking proper coaching, this dedicated group played for one season in a league which stretched across the whole of East Anglia. The pre-season preparations weren't great: a 12-0 home defeat against Dunstable, followed in late August 1994 by a friendly against a touring Sheffield Wednesday Ladies team at Stopsley Sports Centre in Luton. Oddly, this game was played across 3 thirds of 30 minutes each, but it didn't help, as the Ladies were lucky to come second in a 16-0 defeat.

Undaunted, they began their league campaign, which included trips to Huntingdon, Cambridge, Milton Keynes, Colchester, Clacton and Gorleston on the Norfolk Coast. To be sure, there were some heavy defeats, but one match which sticks in the memory was a trip to Gorleston in October 1994 on a wet and miserable Sunday afternoon, which resulted in a 9-0 victory!

My overriding memory of the season was attendance at a League Meeting held at Cambridge City FC. It was held in one of the smokiest rooms I've ever been in and consisted mainly of a group of large women berating everyone present for their poor administration and reporting of results. I felt duty-bound at the end of this tirade to point out that the League Tables which they had distributed were wrong – the 'goals for' did not add up to the same total as the 'goals against'. I think I was lucky to escape without getting beaten up by 6 very burly female Committee Members!



More successful was the **Lea Sports Netball Team** which ran for eight seasons between 1989 and 1997. The ladies were in fact the first Lea Sports team to win a Championship, taking the Luton & Dunstable Netball Alliance Division 2 title in their first season, with a win rate of 93%. Three successful seasons in Division 1 then followed, until in 1992-93 they went unbeaten in taking the title and winning promotion to the Premier Division. Despite folding after 2 games of their Premier campaign in 1993-94, the team reformed in 1995 and played 2 more seasons in the Premier League. One of the highlights of the netball era was the League Cup Final in June 1996 against Vauxhall Golds, one of the strongest teams in the league. The Golds were too strong for us on the day, but everyone was amazed when we turned up with flags and scarves to support the girls. They may have won the match, but we certainly won the competition for best supporters!
