Undoubtedly, our best games were against the two top teams when we gained a draw against G.I.S Leagrave and a win and a draw against Co-op Kestrel Reserves. Nevertheless, against some of the least able teams we were dragged down to a level which deserved defeat.

Defensively we were as good as anyone in the Division but had the perennial problem of lack of clinical finishing.

A good season ? Certainly !

I am disappointed that yet again we have failed to achieve what we know we are capable of - promotion. 
